
## Wappingers' varsity four made waves among boys crew All-Stars

Raised voices and tempers were some of the ingredients for success, it seems. A little vomit, too, didn't hurt.

The occasional discord wasn't an obstacle the Wappingers crew had to overcome. Instead, those instances helped fuel its varsity four boat during the season.

"Sometimes it was tough because they're senior boys and they're going on to row in college," said coxswain Ally Spath, a junior. "They know what they're talking about, so sometimes if I'm saying otherwise, it was hard getting them to agree with me."

Spath's voice often raised, and she often won those arguments. And their varsity four boat often won those races.

The crew of Matt Reilly, Baltazar Castillo-Varda, John Mascia, John Costa and Spath excelled, winning a Hudson Valley Rowing League title and placing fourth in the state championships. Those were among the achievements that earned them the Poughkeepsie Journal's Boys Boat of the Year.

Reilly was the de facto leader, a literal standout at 6-foot-6, who will row at Drexel University. The senior took first in the Arlington Invitational erg race and the Hudson River Indoor Sprints, setting an event record by completing the two-kilometer race in six minutes, 17 seconds. He also was the stroke seat in the varsity four. Castillo-Varda, headed to Syracuse University, was three seat and described as the group's strongest rower. Spath, in her second season as coxswain, became a vocal leader — a motivator, strategist and guide.

"She brings a lot of energy and did a great job of keeping us focused," Reilly said.

That quintet also won the WARS Regatta and was part of a varsity eight boat that took first in the Triangulars Regatta.

"I push myself really hard," Castillo-Varda said. "And, normally when I do really well, I end up throwing up."

Spath nodded in affirmation. Fortunately (or unfortunately) for them, it happened quite often.
